

The Latin American region is undoubtedly complex and each country deserves targeted attention when troubling human rights situations arise. But we would like to underscore the importance of **consultation aimed at advancing a true multilateral human rights agenda.** To the extent that the United States government is able to build legitimacy internationally, it will re-gain credibility in Latin America as well. We understand that the US government faces multiple competing priorities, but we would like to highlight a few areas where we think progress can be advanced. Specifically, and in **close coordination** with its Latin American counterparts, we urge the Obama administration to:

- 1. Promote and support policies that are respectful of human rights, and in this sense:
 - -Express support for and contribute with information, (i. e. declassifying Defense Department and CIA files); toward **processes of accountability** for past human rights abuses (Argentina, Chile, Peru, Uruguay).
 - Re-think US **drug and anti-terrorism policies** so that they are respectful of human rights, **supporting security policies** that focus on prevention and professionalization of police on the one hand, and that limit and/or regulate the role of the armed forces in tackling common crime and violence associated with drug-trafficking on the other.
 - -Continue to promote and fight for more effective, inclusive, and rights-respecting **immigration** policies (Mexico and Central America).
 - -Underscore the importance of a robust **socio-economic rights** agenda that advances greater equality, while respecting democratic institutions, rule of law, and civil and political rights.
- 2. Advance a political agenda oriented towards the consolidation of peace and democracy in the region, including:
 - Developing a strategic framework to positively engage with new regional mechanisms such as UNASUR and the South American Defense Council to foster stability in Latin America through the managing and prevention of crises, while advancing a human rights agenda.
 - Unequivocally condemning any and all **breakdowns of democratic rule** in the region (whether through military or other forms of coups), highlighting the United States' belief in the rule of law and democratically elected leadership.



- -Supporting a peaceful transition in **Cuba**, recognizing, encouraging, and facilitating humanitarian gestures, as well as a human rights agenda that advances and reflects the interests of the Cuban people in the island.
- -Aiming to make human rights a primary cross-cutting theme in all areas of foreign policy, including free trade agreements, security, energy, etc.

Above all, we would like to stress the importance of having rights-respecting US policies toward Latin America that are **strategic**, **consistent**, **respectful**, **and elaborated in consultation** with governments and civil society organizations of the region.
